

2018 Census results


The 2018 New Zealand Census of Population and Dwellings was held on 6 March 2018. This is the official count by Stats NZ of how many people and dwellings there are in New Zealand.

This information sheet provides an overview of initial results from the census for people in the Māori ethnic group. Ethnicity is self-perceived, and a person can belong to more than one ethnic group.

The Māori population has increased significantly

At the 2018 Census there were 181,194 usual residents in Tāmaki Makaurau who identified as Māori (11.5% of Auckland's population). This is an increase of 38,430 people, or 26.9%, since the 2013 Census. The Māori population has grown more rapidly than the wider Auckland population.

Almost a quarter of Māori live in Auckland


Nearly a quarter (23.4%) of the total New Zealand Māori ethnic population live in Auckland.

The map below shows the distribution of Māori across regional areas. It shows that after Auckland, relatively large proportions of Māori live in the Waikato (14.1%) and Bay of Plenty (11.6%) regions.

One in ten Aucklanders identify as Māori

In 2018, 11.5% of the total Auckland usually resident population identified as Māori, similar to 10.7% at the 2013 Census.

MELAA refers to Middle Eastern, Latin American and African. People could choose more than one ethnicity and categories are not exclusive. Percentages will add to more than 100.

Māori represent a significant proportion of the usual residents in Papakura (26.8%) and Manurewa (26.0%) local board areas. These are two of the local boards that comprise the Southern Initiative (TSI), the remaining being Māngere-Ōtāhuhu and Ōtara-Papatoetoe.


Altogether just over a third (36.7%) of Māori in Tāmaki Makaurau live in the TSI area.



The maps below show the number of the usually resident population in Auckland's 21 local board areas who identify as being of Māori ethnicity, over time. There has been an overall increase in all local board areas between 2006 and 2018.

Number of usual residents identifying as Māori ethnicity, by local board (2006, 2013 and 2018)






Auckland's Māori population is relatively youthful

As the age/sex chart shows below, at the 2018 Census almost a third (31.8%) of the Māori ethnic population in Tāmaki Makaurau was aged between 0 and 14 years, down slightly from 33.6% in 2013.

During that time there was an increase in the proportion aged 20 to 34 years (21.4% in 2013 and 23.7% in 2018), particularly in the Māori male population.

In 2018, a relatively small proportion of Māori in Tāmaki Makaurau (5.0%) were aged 65 years or older. The 45.9% growth rate in this age group is significantly faster than that of the Māori population overall (26.9%).



At the 2018 Census, the median age of the Māori ethnic population in Tāmaki Makaurau was 24.9 years, compared with 34.7 years overall. Māori females (25.9 years) had a higher median age than Māori males (23.9 years).

A note on data sources

In response to issues with the 2018 Census, Stats NZ has, for the first time, used administrative and other data to help fill gaps caused by response rates that were lower than anticipated. More information on data sources used by variable is available on the Stats NZ website. Stats NZ rates the quality of ethnicity data as high.
