2023 Census results European ethnicity in Auckland

About the 2023 Census

The 2023 New Zealand Census of Population and Dwellings was held on 7 March 2023.

This is the official count by Stats NZ of how many people and dwellings there are in New Zealand. It provides a snapshot of New Zealand on census day. Stats NZ used a combined census model in 2023 to produce the highest possible data quality. For more information on what this involved, go to:



This summary report provides an overview of results from the census for people in the broad European ethnic group. Ethnicity is self-reported, and a person can be part of more than one ethnic group.

Similar proportion of Aucklanders were of European ethnicity compared to 2018

At the 2023 Census, 825,144 usual residents in Auckland identified with a European ethnicity (49.8% of Auckland's population). This is a decrease of 16,242 people, or -1.9%, since the 2018 Census.



Most Aucklanders of European ethnicity are New Zealand European

People who identify as New Zealand European accounted for 88.1% of the broad European ethnic group in Auckland. All other groups in this category are much smaller and include English (2.7%), South African European (2.5%), Australian (1.0%) and Dutch (1.0%).


Largest European ethnic groups living in Auckland

As shown below, a quarter (24.4%) of New Zealand's European population live in Auckland. This is a smaller proportion than other ethnicities.

European remains Auckland's largest ethnic group

In 2023, 49.8% of the total Auckland usually resident population identified with a European ethnicity, down from 53.5% at the 2018 Census.


There was variation in the proportions of people living in Auckland's local board areas who identifed with a European ethnicity. The five local board areas with the largest proportion (over 80%) were Aotea/Great Barrier, Waiheke, Rodney, Franklin, Hibiscus and Bays.


The map below shows a visual representation of the first column of the previous table. Hibiscus and Bays, Rodney and Franklin have the largest European populations of all the local boards.

The following map shows that between 2013 and 2023 the largest percentage changes were in Aotea/Great Barrier (+51%) and Rodney (+42%).

Percentage change of usual residents identifying with a European ethnic group, by local board (2013-2023)




Auckland's European population has a relatively older age structure

In 2023, 17.9% of Auckland's European population were aged 65 or older, an increase from 16.4% in 2018. Almost two thirds (64.0%) were aged between 15-64, similar to 2018 (64.6%). There were 18.1% aged between 0-14, slightly lower than in 2018 (19.1%).

Between 2018 and 2023 there was a structural ageing effect. The age graph below shows a decrease in the proportions aged 0 to 14, and an increase in all age groups 60 and over.

In 2023, almost one in five (17.9%) of the European population was aged 65 and over, compared to 8.6% for the rest of Auckland.



The median age of the European population in Auckland was 39.7 years, compared with 35.9 years overall in Auckland. The European ethnic group had the highest median age of all the major ethnic groups.
